



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BORN OF A HISTORIC LEGACY.

Conceived in the spirit of Saint Ignatius of Loyola, Saint Francis Xavier and others, Xavier has been guided by divine direction. In the 16th century, St. Ignatius wrote *The Spiritual Exercises*, a book and program for disciplined, prayerful discernment. When Jesuits later formally entered education, they published *The Ratio Studiorum*, describing the rigorous program of academic studies still characteristic of Jesuit education around the world. Much later, the Jesuit Secondary Educational Association (JSEA) published in the 20th century "The Foundations," writings that explained in modern language the larger goals of Jesuit education.

Xavier and all Jesuit schools in the Jesuit Schools
Network are living dynamic examples of these texts.
We root our efforts in the Spirituality of St. Ignatius
from The Exercises. We may not teach Latin and Greek
and Rhetoric, per se, yet our studies are grounded in
the critical thinking skills that have been hallmarks of
Jesuit education since the 16th century.

For the past sixteen years, we have never lost sight – not for one minute – of our commitment to educate. Xavier continues to inspire the next generation as our students in turn inspire us.

CLARITY AND DISCERNMENT.



A RIPPLE EFFECT.



WHAT BECOMES A LEGACY?

Is it the quest to serve future generations, to make an enduring contribution? We think so. For Jenn and Michael Walton, and Jenn's mom, Carol Morton, the promise of a Jesuit high school was exactly that. As wel as an investment in the future.

"We felt that Xavier was an absolute necessity; we wanted a Catholic high school here in the desert," says Carol Morton, "Xavier received tremendous support from the community. It was very God-directed."

Her daughter, Jenn Walton, who has worked tirelessly at Sacred Heart School, is now in her 18th year there. She is a student services coordinator and resource specialist for the school, committed to advancing a Catholic School education. Her dedication is palpable.

"I feel I serve as a liaison between parents and students here (at Sacred Heart School), and between faculty and students at Xavier," she explains. For Jenn, forging a legacy is crystal-clear. "It's about leaving things better than when you found them."

Michael, similarly, feels that creating a legacy means you improve everything around you. "When I think of legacy, I think of the ability to make a difference while you're there, and to create an opportunity for whomever follows you to make a difference, too."

Long before Xavier had built its first classroom, Carol had served on the Xavier board, happy to support a school in whose mission she wholeheartedly believed. From the beginning, she has been a beacon of light. "I'd known the Rover family, parishioners at Sacred

Heart," Carol explains. "There was never any doubt that Xavier was a sure thing. DoeDee was instrumental in keeping us on-track ... everyone on the board felt it would be a win for the entire Coachella Vallev."

Perhaps the greatest testimonial comes from Jenn and Michael's daughter, Carol's granddaughter, Callie, who graduates from Sacred Heart this year. She will attend Xavier beginning Fall of 2023, ready to begin her longanticipated high school experience.

"I'm excited. I've been at Sacred Heart my whole life, and my best friend is going," says Callie. "It's nice to have it half and half: I know some people but there will be new people, too."

Among her many anticipated endeavors are sports. "I want to play soccer and volleyball, and maybe run track." Callie also appreciates the transition this past year from remote to in-person learning.

"I'm a social person, so having my friends and teachers with me in-person is important," says the 14-year-old eighth grader. A pure delight, Callie will be an exceptional addition to the Xavier freshman class.

Through the years, Carol has been a fan of Xavier's approach. "The discipline students learn is so important during these four years in high school," she says, "practicing that every day, and making it a part of what you do for your life, supports the foundations of these students." She adds, "they take that out into the world." Michael also sees the strong connections between their family's generations.



"Callie is proud of her mom and grandma," he says, "who've helped create many programs for the schools." Jenn has been a force.

"We strive to make sure students who are academically, emotionally or physically challenged are just as welcome at Xavier as anyone else," she explains. "God doesn't see them any differently and Xavier doesn't either. I hope we've helped in that process."

Of the programs Jenn has coordinated, she shares that Xavier's meaningful retreats show her students what's possible. "Coach Dockery came to speak to our children. He brought the Xavier National Honors Society faculty and seniors. They did a retreat on integrity, with speakers who addressed our eighth graders, and another group speaking to our sixth and seventh graders," she explains. "There were 16 groups in all." The children gained "insights into integrity, values, foundations, and decision-making."

Callie's class, who will graduate Xavier in 2027, has been at Sacred Heart since preschool. The Kinder Field Trip helped plant the seeds at a young age, and now they're ready to flourish. Jenn shares the kindergarten children wore t-shirts that said Class of 2027. "Some 35 of the 70 children went on the kindergarten field trip to Xavier," explains Jenn. "Callie's grade is one of our most solid groups." Carol couldn't be more pleased.

"Every year watching the school grow has been lovely," she says. "Xavier cements students with ideals, beliefs, and a strong education with a Catholic background."

Jenn knows that a religious education works. "I've seen the results: all those kids that have graduated - the accomplishments not only at Xavier but also at the university level," she says. "They're earning money, and they're happy." Jenn's previous students continue to excel in multiple career paths.

"Xavier is at the top of the list in all ways," says Carol, "it has been a joy to watch the school be as successful as it is." The legacy takes root and becomes something profound. Something which, most of all, endures.

THE VELASQUEZ FAMILY

XAVIER'S IMPACT COMES FULL CIRCLE.

Nick and Denise Velasquez are a testament to the virtues of the Xavier experience. Having met as high school students, they reconnected and got married in their 20s after Denise graduated from Santa Clara University. Founded in 1851 and California's oldest operating institution of higher learning, Santa Clara is a highly-respected private Jesuit university where Denise could continue her education.

Having both graduated Xavier in 2011, part of the second class, the couple is quick to credit Xavier for each of their respective journeys.

"When I attended Xavier as a student, I had come from a public school system," Denise says. "Xavier was a whole different reality; I wanted to be with my friends at the public school," she explains, "but Xavier soon had a very special place in our hearts and a huge influence in our lives."

Nick points out the care and conscientiousness of the teachers. "I valued that one-on-one attention I received as a student," he says, "teachers took the time to get to know students and help them push past challenges so they could live up to their potential."

Denise echoes the sentiment and references the donations of generous givers who made possible her Xavier education. "We couldn't have done it without the financial support of donors," she explains. "My mom was a single mom. Without the donors' help, I wouldn't have been able to go." With four generations of their family in the Coachella Valley, both Nick and Denise were the first in their families to attend Xavier (they had siblings who subsequently attended). All these years later, Denise is a vital part of Xavier.

Denise is in her eighth year teaching at Xavier, currently in the pre-AP science area. She had intended to go to medical school but realized halfway through college she was not passionate about becoming a doctor. As it turns out, here is what she IS passionate about: teaching. An integral part of Xavier's faculty, Denise teaches with the same rigorous academic excellence, complemented by a warm, welcoming culture, that she received as a student.

"I'm a science nerd so I love teaching it," explains
Denise. "It's so rewarding that students love coming
to my class; I enjoy making connections with students
... I'm seeing them at the beginning of their journey
because I teach freshmen." She adds, "I remind myself
how much I grew in those four years at Xavier."

Nick, who worked on Xavier's staff from 2016 to 2022 in security and "to fill the gaps" with what was needed, is now at Eisenhower Health. Together, Denise and Nick are forming, literally, three future Xavier students. They have three children under the age of four: Camilla, the oldest, and the twins, Araya and Ezekiel, just one-and-a-half. Let's just say they're very, very busy.

On access to a private Jesuit education, Nick sees the big picture. "It's important for people to look past the tuition, to see the whole experience, and trust the process," he says. "If it's God's plan that certain students are meant to go to Xavier, they will."



Denise's favorite Xavier memories include the extracurriculars. "The Kairos retreats! We went to several, and they had a big effect on us," she says. "We attended the third one (K3) and I led the fourth one. Denise continues, "coming back as a teacher, I led my own K retreats. It's wonderful to see it from that perspective."

As Nick shares, "we both led a junior retreat as students and as faculty." Nick and Denise have been moved by the embrace of Xavier's community.

"Now that I teach at Xavier, the whole faculty and staff have their arms open to our children," says Denise. "They are a part of our lives." She adds, "whether it's a tragedy or a happy occasion, the school is loving and supportive." Nick agrees. "When people need prayers, Xavier is the first to offer them," he says. "Xavier always comes together as a community." Denise reflects on their journey since high school.

"Our story is humbling," she says, "to see how much we've grown since we were 14 and 15 years old. Xavier has had a huge impact in our lives."

For Nick and Denise Velasquez, the Xavier legacy comes full circle: as former students, as faculty, and one day, when their toddlers become teenagers, as parents.

THE GIST FAMILY

TIME-HONORED. FUTURE-FORWARD.

It is a yearslong legacy, remarkable by any measure. The Gist and Bianco story is one of hard work, business savvy, philanthropy, and above all, family. Their generous support of Xavier goes way back, starting with Francesca's parents, Harlene and Robert O. "Bobby" Bianco. As always, it's about family.

"It feels like our family at Xavier," explains Francesca. "You want everyone to share that faith, of having their arms around you." Jonathan agrees. "Xavier knows our children not just as students but as people."

Jonathan and Francesca Gist are proud parents whose three sons, Bobby, Franky and Anthony, carry on their family's good work. Bobby, the oldest, graduated from Xavier and attended Holy Cross, and both Franky, a senior, and Anthony, a freshman, are currently students at Xavier. Their young daughter, Vincenza, in the sixth grade at Sacred Heart, will be a Xavier student in the not-too-distant future.

Franky, who is now receiving acceptances from multiple colleges and universities, has come into his own at Xavier. "Franky has really grown in the last year and a half," shares Jonathan. For Anthony's part, he transitioned easily from middle school to high school. "He loves it," Francesca shares, "it helps that teachers know his older brother."

All of them value education. Francesca, like her father, graduated from the University of Notre Dame. She is confident about placing her faith in Xavier. "I trust they have our kids' best interest in mind," she says. "They want the best for our children."

Urged by her father, Jonathan and Francesca moved to the desert years ago when they had small children. "We had babies and were living in LA at the time," explains Francesca, "my dad wanted us to move to the Coachella Valley." And so they did, and never looked back.

The family's love affair with Xavier began, as alluded to, when Bobby and Harlene gave generously to help establish the school. Though they are no longer with us, the Biancos' support mattered. Without hesitation, they donated from their thriving agricultural business, Anthony Vineyards, to help Xavier realize its vision as the Valley's only private Jesuit high school. Their financial and professional triumph is itself a pivotal story, a tribute to the American Dream.

The Bianco family left Italy for New York in the early part of the century, working in the New York produce market. They then moved west to California, where the produce was grown. Anthony Bianco left New York in the early 1940s with his wife and eight children, relocating to Fresno. Decades later, some of the family moved to the desert in 1969 to start their agricultural business here. The four Bianco sons, who worked for Francesca's grandfather, pooled their money to buy 100 acres of land in the East Valley. The rest, as we all know, is history.

Anthony Vineyards has become one of the world's leading growers of table grapes, and a major employer that has for many years supported thousands of farmworkers and their families. Xavier has been a fortunate benefactor because the Biancos understood the dream. There is no doubt that Bobby's unexpected death two years ago, seven months after his beloved Harlene passed, was a loss of incalculable magnitude. But what remains is his magnificent, undeniable legacy.



Much like their parents, Jonathan and Francesca honor the passed-down traditions from their grandfather's Italian family. Francesca notes that their children spent a good deal of time with their grandfather, especially over the past two years.

Jonathan, who grew up in the Chicago area, articulates how Catholic high schools have such a good reputation and close-knit community. "You have multiple generations who all went to the same high school because they lived in the same neighborhood for years," he says. "When I first learned they were building Xavier from scratch, I thought this is a place where we can provide that same opportunity to our children."

As Jonathan says, the Gist family is committed to supporting Xavier and its mission. "We hope to add to the Bianco family legacy of giving, and add to it at Xavier."


When the Gists moved out from LA, Jonathan took a job in sales at Anthony Vineyards, and now works out in the field, overseeing all labor. The Gists are clear, though, that their children should go into the business only if it calls to them.


These days, they are happy to see the students inperson, all together. As Jonathan says, "things are back to normal ... you walk on campus and you feel the school spirit."



THE VUKSIC FAMILY

HOW TO BUILD A LEGACY: DESIGN IT.

You'd be hard-pressed to find a family as productive and creative as the Vuksics. For starters, John Vuksic, a partner in Palm Desert-based architectural firm PVG Architects, has been involved in numerous Xavier campus projects. John's wife, Leigh Ann, heads up the firm's interior design services, and now, their youngest child, Stark, a 2019 Xavier graduate, is pursuing an advanced degree in architecture at the University of Oregon.

Add to that what John Vuksic and his family affectionately refer to as The Crew: all four of his children attended Xavier: Paige, Lindsey, Avery, and Stark, plus three of their four significant others. Two spouses and a girlfriend all attended Xavier. Only one spouse is the odd man out, having not attended Xavier. Still, that's a sports team in the making.

But it doesn't end there. Following in his father's illustrious footsteps, Stark not only graduates with a degree in architecture in 2024 (including two minors in business and interior architecture) but also is designing his first official project: Xavier's Sports Plaza.

Call it a legacy made visible. As part of the continuing campus expansion, Stark's ability to design projects for his favorite high school is nothing short of exhilarating.

"I feel like it's an opportunity to impact the school I love," Stark explains, "I'm able to see it grow; it makes me excited for all the future generations." He continues.

"I got to meet with DoeDee and Mr. Campbell on the project," he shares, brimming with enthusiasm. When

completed, Xavier's Sports Plaza will include five beach volleyball courts, an indoor practice field, with a protected environment for harsh weather, and areas that connect with the softball and baseball facilities. For his part, John is filled with gratitude for the many advantages Xavier has given to his children.

"Xavier is like a family. The faculty has been so involved with my kids' lives and their growth," explains John. "I'm extremely grateful for that. Xavier has been instrumental in shaping the people they've become."

The sense of appreciation is not lost on Stark, who comments on his positive relationships with his teachers. "What's great about Xavier is how the teachers want you to do well," says Stark. "I consider myself good friends with all the teachers I had," he says. Not too many graduates these days can say that. But then again, not too many high schools are Xavier.

On deciding to pursue architecture, a very specialized major, Stark has clarity and conviction. "Once I was in the weeds, it felt right," he explains. "It's a way for me to express myself and explore my creativity in a field that's challenging." He loves the college environment and is eager to give back to Xavier.



In addition, John continues to design the campus's future additions. "I've been involved with Xavier on many projects over the years," he explains. "The most recent Xavier masterplan includes The Great Hall, The Chapel, the swim complex, and amenities for the football field." John is elated about his son's achievements.

"I like to say Stark is wise beyond his years," says John, "he expresses himself so much better than I do, it's not even close," he comments, adding, "I couldn't be more proud."

Stark looks back fondly on his years at Xavier. "I loved when I was an upperclassman and talking to the freshmen, mostly soccer players: I wanted them to do their best," he says. "Now it's about how can I impact the school as a whole?" Stark jokes about consulting with his father and partners.

"I talk to the Big Kahunas a lot," he says, "about how to adjust the master plan to fit everything. Xavier has so much potential, we all want to see them succeed ..." Stark is looking forward to creating a space for events that was once a gravel lot.

"I feel like I've achieved a lot. I have one more year after this," says Stark. "I'll see where life takes me. I'm glad to be in a field that's expanding." He is inspired to do great work and to make his mark.

"It's great to see Stark excited to be a part of Xavier's growth through design," says John.

Just think of all the future generations who will enjoy attending Xavier as its campus continues to expand. Here's to the power of family, impact, and designing a legacy.

We're excited to share our proposed steps for the next chapter.

Proposed Great Hall: most urgently needed is the Great Hall. The planned 63,000 sq. ft. building will provide 13 classrooms, a venue/kitchen for dining and events, and a long sought-after larger common area. With a space to forge relationships and develop vital life skills, here students can convene to collaborate and socialize daily. There will be display cases for trophies, a place to showcase Xavier's history, and staff offices that support our students and their families. Moreover, the mezzanine level will offer a quiet space for study and a balcony to view Xavier's home games.

Proposed Competition Field Stadium: at

the heart of our campus. Transforming our existing football venue into a permanent facility, the stadium will host all field events. Bleacher systems for visitors and home guests with lighting for night games are planned. Home bleachers will include bathrooms and a revenue-producing snack bar below. The stadium area will provide a place to host youth football and soccer for the community as well as a setting for family picnics and outreach events. It'll be the home of the Saints!

Proposed Indoor Sports Complex: the complex will provide a protected training space for our athletes. Shielded from the extreme heat and windy weather, our athletes can thrive. The goal is to strengthen injury prevention and optimize game-day performance.



Proposed Chapel Building: a multipurpose

facility, the space would function as an essential part of our Xavier experience. With additional classrooms, room for retreats and meetings, campus ministry, and a service and immersion center, the proposed building would be utilized every day. We would host Companions' Dinners and smaller events as well. And while we believe our chapel is wherever we gather to pray and reflect, we're inspired to designate a formal venue.

Proposed Swim and Water Polo Complex:

designed not only for our student practices and hosted competitions but also for the public. The complex would be a community asset for all to enjoy. From swimming lessons to water aquatics for seniors, the complex would provide opportunities to generate revenue.

Proposed Performing Arts Building: a

dedicated building to house numerous practice sessions and of course shows. This will provide a beautiful site for the calendared events scheduled throughout the year.

We envision that our next phase will look and feel like the Xavier that has graduated almost 1,500 students. A place that promises, above all, to impact the lives of thousands more to come.





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
